## INTRODUCTION

## PURPOSE

The ABCS Fine Arts Competition is intended to provide fine arts competition and fellowship for Fundamental Independent Baptist schools with like standards of faith and practice. The critique of the judges will help to direct the students as they strive to enhance their skills. It will also give our young people an opportunity to compete with other young people of like faith and practice as well as opportunities to develop leadership skills. Selection of material, quality of performance, appearance, attitude, and attentiveness at events should reflect the character objectives of Jesus Christ our Lord.
COST
The cost for Fine Arts per student entered is $\$ 5$, regardless of how many entries by the student. Financial information is found on page 80 .

## AWARDS

Ribbons will be given for first, second, and third place in each category. Those who score a $50 \%$ or lower will not qualify to place. Entries are expected to be of top quality. When there are two or more in a category, the judges will discuss who deserves which place. Being well prepared for fine arts competition is challenging and rewarding for both the contestant and the sponsor school. It will bring glory to the Lord and be a great testimony to Christians and non-Christians alike. We urge you to start early in the school year in your preparation for fine arts competition. Set goals for each event you are entering so that everything is ready for competition. BE SURE YOU HAVE READ THE REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH CATEGORY YOU ARE ENTERING SO YOU WILL KNOW WHAT IS EXPECTED.

## HOW TO PREPARE

1. PRAY

Each contestant and sponsor should be PRAYING about the events in which a contestant should enter. Some young people need to PRAY for courage to try some different events. (I Thes 5:17; Php 4:6)

## 2. SELECT EVENTS

First, go through the events list and appropriate sections of these GUIDELINES, and pick out events you feel the Lord would want you to perform or participate in. Then ask a teacher, good Christian friend, or parent if he sees any special events that he thinks would be good for you to try this year. (seek Godly wisdom - James 1:5; Proverbs 3:5-6)

## 3. SET GOALS

Read the appropriate sections in GUIDELINES to be sure of the requirements for each category. Set goals for yourself in each event. Get a head start on non-performing events. These events could be started in the fall of the year. (Php 3:14)
4. ASK FOR HELP

Find some Godly person who will help you in each event you have chosen. (Prov 11:13; Prov 15:22)

## 5. PRACTICE

The old saying is "Practice makes perfect." Use every opportunity possible to practice and perform in front of an audience. (I Cor 15:58)
6. POLISH

Work hard to achieve a polished product by the time competition comes. God wants the best in all that we do for Him. (Col 3:17)

## 7. SCRIPTURE

ONLY THE KING JAMES BIBLE IS ALLOWED TO BE USED IN ALL COMPETITION. Entries using any other version will be or disqualified. It is suggested that entries refrain from using paraphrases of Scripture in order to avoid confusion regarding this rule.

## GRADE DIVISIONS

Fine arts competition is broken down into $4^{\text {th }}-6^{\text {th }}, 7^{\text {th }}-9^{\text {th }}$, and $10^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grades. Read the rules for each grade division carefully as they may differ from one grade division to another.

A lower grade contestant may enter a group category in music (duet, ensemble, etc.) with one or more contestants from a higher grade level. All contestants in the entry will be judged in the higher-grade category.

## NUMBER OF EVENTS

Each contestant is limited to a total of three entries in the platform performing areas of Academics, Music, and Speech. Examples: Spelling Bee, Vocal Solo, Bible teaching.

Contestants cannot be in a position of competing against themselves, an example is singing in two trios.

Schools are limited to bringing two entries per category and grade level. Please only submit your top two art projects per grade competition levels in each category.

Platform Performances include:

- Any music piece performed except choir, band or chimes/handbells.
- Any Speech/ Preaching.
- Spelling Bee


## ENTRIES

All non-platform events need to be dropped off at the ABCS host school (Carroll Christian School) on Choir and Project Day (the day before the Competition). Please have a representative from your school stay to help set up your entries. Projects need to be set up at the host school by 12:00 p.m. This includes Artwork, Sewing, Needlework, \& Photography. Please make sure they are accompanied by a $3^{\prime \prime}$ by $5^{\prime \prime}$ index card (see sample in appendix) with the following information printed or type written:

Be sure to include patterns or pictures that were used.

## SPECIAL NOTE TO SCHOOL COORDINATORS

Contestants will be judged on what they perform or turn in at Fine Arts Competition. Often, they will come to you for advice and guidance. Please be sure that you are personally familiar with each section of GUIDELINES to better coach your students. It would be wise to read the entire manual at least once. Information on individual categories could be copied, posted, or handed out. Please note that judging forms are included with each major area. These may also be used to help contestants better prepare.

On the ABCS website, there is a link to register each student and choirs. Those students that are (only) involved in Choir do not need to register individually. This would mean they are not preforming in anything on Friday, and do not have a project to be judged on Thursday. This registration must be completed by March $\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$. Please complete your roster by typing in your entries (nothing handwritten) and emailing the excel document to the Director.

Please do not let contestants participate who are unprepared or who have not met the requirements for a particular category.

Judges/helpers must be provided by each school that is participating for each day (Bible Quiz and Competition Day). Please be prepared to provide 1 judge for every 5 entries submitted, Add up how many entries you have in each category total in your school and divide by 5; that is how many judges need provided. If extras are available that is even better! There is a form on the website, www.abcsedu.com, to submit the names of all judges/helpers who will be coming from your school. School parents and church members are encouraged to volunteer to judge or help in other areas.

## Carroll Welcome Desk and Foyer

This is the "headquarters" for Fine Arts Competition. The location will be clearly marked. Completed judging forms and placement cards will be turned in here by the head judge or a runner in each area. The Tally Desk in the foyer has the final say in all matters
pertaining to competition and judging and has the authority to override judges' decisions if necessary.

The Fine Arts Staff has the time consuming job of tabulating all results from all categories of competition. Judges must be sure to submit completed judging forms as early in the day as possible along with the placement card provided in judging packet.

## JUDGES

The judges are an extremely important part of competition. They are volunteers from the participating schools. Every attempt will be made to have three judges (one head judge and two assistants) in every category. All individuals (faculty, staff, parents, etc.) who feel qualified in a particular area are urged to volunteer. Judges should be familiar with the rules and responsibilities that they are responsible to judge (including judging forms) before arriving at Fine Arts Competition. These forms can be found on the ABCS website.

Judges should attempt to remain on campus throughout the competition or, at a minimum, until their category has been completed and the Competition/Tally office has approved the awarding of places for that category.

## Parents should never judge a competition where their own child is a competitor.

## OTHER

Projects such as Art and Fabric, Thread and Needle may be started no earlier than June 1st of the school year for which competition is scheduled (i.e. 6/1/2014 for the 2015 competition). Please do not submit work which was not completed in the appropriate time frame.

## WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU ARRIVE AT ABCS FINE ARTS COMPETITION:

## Thursday - Choir and Project Day

1. Sponsors - bring to host school all non-performing entries which are artwork; sewing, and needlework; written Essays, stories, or poems. These non-platform items need to be set up at the host school by Thursday by 12:00 p.m. A representative from each school must assist setting up their own entries. Each entry must have 3 judging forms included. Student information must be filled out, but judging area left blank. If sponsors need to make arrangements to deliver earlier, please contact the Director. Late projects will not be judged.
2. Volunteers to judge non-performing entries should be at the host school by 12:00 p.m. A judging meeting will promptly start at 12:00 for nonperformance categories. Please make sure you have brought the correct ratio of judges to projects submitted.
3. Volunteers to judge choirs must be at the host school by $8: 30 \mathrm{am}$.
4. Lunches will be provided for judges only. Students, chaperones, and school staff will not have lunches provided.
5. Each school involved in choir will have a preset time to compete. Upon arrival, choirs should report to the auditorium. Choirs will not be permitted to visit the project area in the gym.

## Friday - Competition Day

1. All students and sponsors present on the property should be in the assembly room by 9:00 a.m. One chaperone from each school should stay with students.
a. There will be a brief opening meeting before students are dismissed to begin competition.
2. Judges should report to the judge's meeting room at 9:00 a.m.
3. After a school has finished all their competitions for the day, they may leave the property. At least one representative must stay long enough to gather all rewards earned by their school as well as all projects in the gym.
4. No projects are to be left at Carroll Christian after Friday's competition. Rewards will be attached to all projects that placed.
5. Lunches will be provided for judges only. Students, coaches, and school staff not involved in judging must preorder and pay for their lunch by March $1^{\text {stt }}$.

## DRESS CODE

## PERSONAL APPEARANCE (MALE)

HAIR:
Male contestants must have standard, conservative haircuts. The hair is to be off the collar. It is to be above the ears, with sideburns no longer than the middle of the ear. Male sponsors and guests may wear neatly trimmed facial hair. Sponsor schools should review the students they are bringing to ensure compliance.

ATTIRE:
Male contestants must wear dress shirt, tie, and long trousers at all times. A solid color polo with dress trousers is also acceptable, for Bible Quizzing and nonperformance categories. School logos are acceptable on polos. There are to be no pull-on or pull-over shirts that are not polo style. Also, there will be no blue jeans, denim-type trousers, denim jackets, or casual trousers with patch pockets. No tennis shoes are allowed.

## PLATFORM COMPETITION:

A suit or slacks and a dress shirt (tucked in), and a tie will be worn. A jacket is not required. No blue jeans are allowed. Shoes should be dress shoes and should be shined. Dignity and good grooming should be apparent. Clothing should be clean and neatly pressed. Uniformity of dress is recommended for groups.

## PERSONAL APPEARANCE (FEMALE)

## ATTIRE:

An image of Christian discretion and modesty is to be portrayed. Girls must wear dresses or skirts which are no shorter than the middle of the knee. (The hem of the skirt should touch the floor when the girl is in a kneeling position.) Necklines should not be lower than three finger-widths below the clavicle. T-shirts, sleeveless, sheer blouses, form-fitting dresses or skirts, or skirts with slits which extend above the knee are prohibited. Shirts or blouses with writing are not allowed. Ankle-socks, knee-socks, or tights should be worn at all times. Flip flops, clogs, open-backed shoes without a strap, and tennis shoes may not be worn. Excessive make-up is not to be worn. Jewelry must be conservative and minimal. Only simple earrings that are not excessively long are allowed.

## PLATFORM COMPETITION:

Appropriate attire would be a nice dress or skirt and blouse (no denim skirts), shoes and socks or tights. Blouses may have no lace so as to give a see-through appearance. Dignity, modesty, and good grooming should be apparent. Clothing should be clean and neatly pressed. Uniformity of dress is recommended for groups.

NOTE: CONTESTANTS ARE REQUIRED TO COMPLY WITH ALL REQUESTS MADE BY THE COMPETITION OFFICE REGARDING DRESS.

THE DRESS CODE MUST BE HONORED BY ALL COMPETITORS AND SPONSORS. This includes judges. Coordinators, please make sure your volunteers and school staff are aware of the dress code.

We realize that dress standards can be very difficult to document and enforce and, therefore, insist on the patience and cheerful cooperation of all competitors, sponsor schools, judges, parents, observers, and others who may be involved in fine arts competition. Please do your part by communicating to your school representatives to please comply, without quarrel or bad spirit.

The Competition office will be glad to hear comments and questions.

## AREA 1: ACADEMIC

## I. BIBLE MEMORY

This is a memory competition. Students will be expected to memorize a book or passage of the Bible, then quote it in front of a judging panel. Each word will count as one point. Students will need to bring three paper copies of the book or passage being quoted for judges to notate. Students will be allowed three prompts from judges, but judges will only prompt when asked by the student.

1. If a word is mumbled or unclear it will count against the student.
2. Only the King James Bible will be used.
3. If a student misses a word, they will lose one point per missed word.
4. If a student adds a word, they will lose one point per added word.
5. The student with the highest score will be awarded first place. The first-place individual does not have to quote the entire passage, just have the highest score.
6. If a student says something incorrect directly before they ask for a prompt, the words spoken incorrectly will still count against the student.

If there are more than 15 students competing in a particular age group, this competition will turn into a Spelling Bee style competition. Students will line up youngest to oldest and will quote one verse at a time until there is a winner. Only, the last two students standing will follow double elimination rules.

## II. SPELLING TEST

$4^{\text {th }}-6^{\text {th }}$ grade
The lists of spelling words are found in this section of the manual; please be sure to use the correct list for the current year. The words must be spelled exactly as they appear on these lists (including capitalization).

Each school is allowed to bring three spelling contestants for this grade division competition: three $4^{\text {th }}-6^{\text {th }}$ graders.

Each contestant is given a lined, pre-numbered paper provided by the Host School. This competition for 4th - 6th grades will be a written test consisting of 30 words. The judge will pronounce the word twice and use it in a sentence. Contestants will then write the word. Each contestant will write all the words. Following the final word, the judges will collect all papers and grade them. Winners will be selected according to accuracy. Judges will give at least two practice words before starting the competition.

In the event of a tie in 4-6th grade, a bee will be held. In the event that all 4-6th grade words have been spelled correctly, the judge will go on to the $7-9^{\text {th }}$ grade level list. In the event of oral competition, these are the rules:

1. Contestants may repeat letters he/she already stated but may not correct mistakes.
2. No set time limit, but judge might limit "think time"
3. Bell will be rung for incorrect spellings. When a contestant misspells one word, the speller immediately drops out of the competition. At this point they will leave the platform.
4. The pronouncer strives to pronounce the words accurately, and at the request of the speller will give a definition, use in sentence, or re-pronounce the given word.
5. A second judge will be writing down the letters as they are given to verify with the head judge
that the word is correct.
6. When there are two remaining spellers, the contestant is not eliminated until the competitor spells the misspelled word correctly and one additional word. If both contestants misspell the word, a new word is given.

## III. SPELLING BEE

7th- 12th Grades
The judge will read the word which the contestant will repeat if desired and then spell. The contestant may ask for a definition of the word and a sentence that uses the word. The pronouncer shall grant the request until the judges agree that the word has been reasonably clear to the contestant. The contestant has 15 seconds to spell the word. Once the student responds either by repeating the word or starting to spell, they are given 15 seconds to complete the word. The contestant does not have to pronounce the word first, but if he does say the word and pronounces it incorrectly the student will be corrected, assuring that he is spelling the word correctly. All repeating is included in the time limit.
Each school may send their three best competitors for each grade level division. (Three students from 7th - 9th grade, and three students from 10th-12th grades).

1. All contestants will be arranged in a single line and words will be given from left to right, facing the judges
2. Words shall be announced according to the diacritical markings in Webster's Dictionary.
3. The contestant has 15 seconds to spell the word.
4. After starting to spell a word, a contestant may stop and start over, retracing the spelling from the beginning, but there can be no change of letters or their sequence.
5. There will be two rounds through with the words from the list. The third round will begin with words from the next level's word list. The fourth round will be chosen at the Spell Master's discretion.
6. The $7-9$ th and $10-12$ th grade competitors will use the list provided in this book. Elementary grades will use the next grade level's list
7. This is a double elimination competition. Upon misspelling two words, the contestant immediately drops out of the contest. The next word of the pronouncer's list is given to the next contestant.
8. When the contestants are reduced to two, the head spelling judge will stop the competition and review the rules for ending the competition. If the student with one miss misspells another word and the other student still has not missed a word, then the student with no errors is declared the winner. However, if he misses one word, go to next explanation of rules.
9. When the contestants are reduced to two and both contestants have missed one word, the elimination procedure changes. At that point, when one contestant misspells a word, the other contestant shall be given an opportunity to spell that same word and the next word on the list. If the second contestant spells both words correctly, then the second contestant shall be declared the champion.
10. Any question relating to the judging of a word should be referred to the judges before the beginning of the next round. Only school sponsors may make a challenge; parents may not voice a concern to the spell master or the school sponsor.
11. In the event that all the spelling list words are used and the competition is continuing, the head spelling judge will use the list from the next grade level up. $10^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade will use the list for the next year. For example, if List "A" is being used in the competition, and the list has been exhausted, the head judge will continue the competition using words from List " B ".

## IV. POETRY WRITING

$4^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade
The contestant must compose and submit in writing an original poetry composition. The contestant should keep in mind his purpose for the poem, that is, why he is writing it, and what effect he is attempting to achieve. The poem may be a lyric poem, a folk ballad, or a narrative poem. The poem is to be written during the school's allotted time block. The topic, chosen by the FA Director, will be announced at that time. Grades $4^{\text {th }}-9^{\text {th }}$ will be given one hour, $\mathbf{1 0}^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grades will be given two hours to turn in a final copy.

A copy of the final poem along with judging sheets for each should be emailed. The original should be maintained by the home school. The copy must be readable when printed. Make sure students write dark enough that it prints well. All unreadable entries will be disqualified and not judged. Be sure each entry is labeled correctly with the student's name, grade, and school. The finished poems are to be emailed to the judging school by the date given, March 1st.

It should be no shorter than eight lines and no longer than thirty lines. Variations from these line limitations must show evidence of very careful attention to word choice and structure, plus a strong thematic basis. Only one poem per contestant is allowed.

## V. ESSAY WRITING

The contestant must compose and submit in writing an original essay. The contestant should keep in mind his purpose for the essay, that is, why he is writing it, and what effect he is attempting to achieve. The essay must be approved by the sponsor to assure authenticity and originality.

Three copies of the final essay along with judging sheets for each should be mailed. The original should be maintained by the home school. Be sure each entry is labeled correctly with the student's name, grade, and school. The finished poems are to be mailed to the judging school by the date given.

Fourth through twelfth grades will be given a topic by February 20th. Fourth through ninth grade is narrative and tenth through twelfth grade should be expository essays. The topic and starting sentence will be kept hidden until given out at the local school. The local school monitors the students as they will have one or two hours to write. The final copy must be turned in at the end of the allotted time. The essays will then be collected and mailed to the competition.

The essay must have been written during the school assigned one hour (4-9 grades) or two-hour (10-12 grades) block during the school day. It must be the original and authentic work of the
student. Plagiarism of any kind will automatically disqualify the entry. Only one essay per contestant is allowed. Approval by sponsor will assure authenticity and originality.

The creative writing due date is March $1^{\text {st }}$. Academic test scores must be submitted by email to the director, and creative writing must be emailed by this date. Forms for academic test scores are found on the ABSC website.

## VI. ACADEMIC TESTING (put on hold until 2025)

Academic tests will be given in several subjects to students in grades $7-12$. Students may have one hour to complete each test. The tests will be seored by each participating sehool and the results of the two highest students will be sent to the Fine Arts Director. The form to submit highest seores are on the ABCS website. Winners will be announced on competition day. Students in grades 7 9 may take one or more of the junior high tests. Students in grades $10-12$ may take one or more of the senior high tests. Tests will be given in the following subjects: English, math, seience, history, and Bible.
VII. HISTORY PROJECTS (Grades 4-12)
A. The project base must be no larger than $3 \times 5$ feet. There is no height restriction.
B. The project must be entirely the work of the student. Adult help should be given only verbally (i.e., advice or instruction). Each project must be accompanied by the Judge's Information Sheet (On back of the judging sheet) that tells exactly how much parental help was given. Some parental help may be given in the area of power tools, etc., for younger students. Their help must also be reported on the Judge's Information Sheet.
C. Two students, competing in the same grade division, may work together on the History Project.
D. Requirements:

- Format - both handwritten copy and typed copy (matching - adult may type as written, and help with proofreading, but must not tell student what to write)
- Font and margin - Times New Roman 12 point double-spaced, one-inch margins
- Research - A bibliography and an outline are required (Footnotes are required for $7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade)
- Minimum Length (not including bibliography and outline)
- $4^{\text {th }}-6^{\text {th }}-2$ full pages
- $7^{\text {th }}-9^{\text {th }}-3$ full pages
- $10^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}-5$ full pages
E. The project must show the importance of a current event, an historical event, a person in history or report on cultural awareness or cultural differences in a country throughout our world. The more original the display, the higher the score will be in the originality category. Students should be rewarded for presenting a well-constructed, conservative, Biblical worldview. Specifically, the more advanced grades should exhibit the student's ability to think critically. The paper should include an outline and bibliography.
F. The projects will be evaluated in the following areas:

Content 30\%

- Information presented accurately (5 points)
- Emphasizes important parts (5 points)
- Content is presented with correct grammar (5 points)
- Inclusion of strong thesis statement (5 points)
- Information presented is well organized (5 points)
- The paper has a Bibliography pages $\left(7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}\right.$ must use footnotes as well) (5 points)

Display 25\%

- Student's work shows carefulness and neatness (5 points)
- Impact of display emphasizes thesis and its supporting points (5 points)
- Artistic work supports the thesis (5 points)
- The exhibit displays creativity (5 points)
- The student's work displays skill (5 points)

Originality 20\%

- The exhibit presents a unique idea in presentation material (10 points)
- It displays clarity of material (10 points)

Project's Impact 25\%

- The exhibit draws a conclusion (13 points)
- The exhibit shows the importance of the event, the person, or the cultural awareness discussed relative to the thesis (12 points)


## VIII. SCIENCE EXPERIMENT PROJECT (Grades 7-12)

A. The project base must be no larger than 3 X 5 feet. $7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade should be biological or physical experiment based. Projects should arrive at the host school on Thursday before the Friday competition.
B. Schools bringing projects that require special equipment or resources (water, drain, electricity, etc.) should inform the host school of that need before the day of the competition.
C. Requirements:

- Scientific method: All $7^{\boldsymbol{h}}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade science projects must demonstrate a scientific method and must include a logbook, showing the student's day by dav findings. The projects are to present a theory, prove or disprove it through experiment, and draw a conclusion.
- Format - Report must be handwritten and typed (parents may type exactly as student has written)
- Report Maximum Length - 2 pages double-spaced 12-point Times New Roman
- Judges Information Sheet
- Biblical Abstract or Principle - in paper or on board or both (does not have to be a Bible verse)
D. Every project must be accompanied by a report in the student's own handwriting. This paper should then be typed, exactly as the child has written it. (Typing may be done by an adult.) For the efficiency of the judges' time, the typed copy may not exceed two doublespaced pages. Both the typewritten copy and the handwritten original papers will accompany the project in order for it to be judged. The paper must be the student's own words, not copied from a source. Parents may proofread but should not tell the student what to write.
E. The project must be entirely the work of the student. Adult help may be given only in the verbal sense of giving advice or instruction. Each project must be accompanied by the

Judge's Information Sheet with a detailed description of any help that the student received from parents or teachers. It is understood that younger students may need some help with power tools, etc., but even that help must be reported on the Judge's Information Sheet. Individual schools will validate the Judge's Information Sheet before copying it on the back of the judging sheet.
F. $\quad \mathbf{7}^{\text {th }}-\mathbf{1 2}^{\text {th }}$ grade projects should include a biblical abstract or principle that is related to this area of scientific study or to an aspect of the project. This principle should either be included in the display or the paper or both. A Bible verse, on the board or in the paper, is not required.
G. Two students, competing in the same grade division, may work together on the Science Project.

## VIV. SCIENCE RESEARCH PROJECT (Grades 4-6)

A. This project will be similar to $7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ but may be more of a "research project" (e.g.: blue whales; an experiment is not required. However, projects that show the scientific method will be graded higher). Each project must be accompanied by a report in the child's own handwriting. This paper must then be typed, exactly as the student had written it. (An adult may do the typing.) It should be double-spaced and use the Times New Roman 12 font. Include both the typewritten copy and the handwritten original with the project.
B. The project base must be no larger than 3 X 5 feet.
C. Projects should arrive at the host school on Thursday before the Friday competition.
D. The project must be entirely the work of the student. Adult help should be given only verbally (i.e. advice or instruction). Each project must be accompanied by the Judge's Information Sheet (On back of the judging sheet) that tells exactly how much parental help was given.
E. The paper must be in the student's own words. It must not be copied from a source. Parents may help with the proofreading but should not tell the students what to write. The essay is to be a MAXIMUM of 2 pages. These page requirements do NOT include the outline and bibliography.
F. This project will be judged on the following:

Research \& Development: Thorough research, irrefutable references, knowledgeable \& logical presentation paper in good form. Information presented accurately. Content is presented with correct grammar. Inclusion of strong thesis statement. Information presented is well organized.

Technical Skill and Display: Neat, attracts attention, creatively designed
Topic: Appropriate for grade level. Interesting and easy to incorporate into a specific field of science. (Biology, chemistry, physics, etc.)

Biblical Abstract: Paper does not need to have a Bible verse, but it does need to support a biblical principle.

Conclusions \& Findings: Substantial, reliable \& beneficial findings.

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

## Schools are limited to two (2) pieces of art per category for grade divisions $4^{\text {th }} \mathbf{- 1 2} \mathbf{1 2}^{\text {th }}$. Please bring only the top two entries from your school for each category.

ALL ART MUST BE ENTIRELY THAT OF THE STUDENT. Nothing may be traced. It must all be free hand. No part of the project should be done by another person. No color or paint by number paintings or drawings are acceptable. If a pattern is used for anything (i.e., design for wood sculpture, etc..., or picture used as an idea for a drawing or painting), it MUST be submitted with the project. All entries must be done in a realistic style -- no abstract or surrealism will be accepted.

All work should meet standards as far as dress codes and suitable subject matter are concerned. (The only exception would be periods of history in which the hair or clothing are in line with the historical period.) Any Scripture verses used with or on art must be from the King James Bible. No artwork should attempt to portray the face of Christ. Only Christian appropriate themes are allowed. No artwork should be of copyrighted characters.

All artwork that is two dimensional, such as photography and sketching, must be displayed in a mat. PreDrawn does not need to be displayed in a mat. Mats should be black. Please keep them as uniform as possible; cutting them yourself is acceptable as well as using black poster board. Our goal is to have something to display the artwork in that is easy to transport, lightweight, and reusable for following years. The mat should be attractive enough that it is not a distraction to the judges. Paper folding, popsicle sticks, and clay modeling entries should be displayed in a creative and attractive fashion.

An Artist idea statement must be with every project except for coloring. A 3X5 title card, printed or typed with the student's name, age and grade, school name, and category must be firmly attached to all entries. The best way is to tape the card to the back of the mat in a corner. Cards may be attached to nonmatted entries (i.e., popsicle sticks) by taping the card to the edge of the bottom of the entry so that it sticks out from under the object and can be clearly seen by the judges. See the appendix for a sample 3X5 card.

## GUIDELINES FOR CATEGORIES

I. BRUSH, PEN, COLORING, DRAWING, PHOTOGRAPHY

COLORING (draw and color) - Students may use marking pens, colored pencils, or crayons to color the picture with. It may not be traced

The following seven categories are matted entries. They are two dimensional and require a mat for the artwork. Please do not frame any of these entries with glass. Please only mat with a standard size black mat.

WATERCOLORS - No paint by number and no pre-drawn pictures will be accepted. Artwork should demonstrate good watercolor technique.

SKETCHING - Charcoal, pencil, etc.; in one color (monochrome) or several colors (polychrome). One medium only, for example, all color pencil, or all color chalk. By adding a second medium (glitter glue) the project becomes 2D Mixed Medium.

2D MIXED MEDIUM - This is a combination of two or more mediums. A combination of any of the following: Pen \& Ink, Pastels, Sketching, Acrylics, or Watercolor.

CHALK PASTELS - Colored chalk, no color by number or pre-drawn pictures.
ACRYLIC - May use brush or palette knife, no paint by number.
PEN \& INK - No color added, includes calligraphy.
PHOTOGRAPHY - There are two categories of photographs -- color, and black \& white. There are three classifications - Architecture, Still Life, and Nature. Contestants may only enter two pictures for photography.

- Only standard print size of $5^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{X} 7$ " should be submitted. Entries may either be processed and/or printed by the participant or by a commercial lab. The manner of processing will be considered in judging, so print accordingly.
- Black \& white does not include sepia.
- No words are allowed to be printed on the photograph or mat.
- Contestants are not allowed to submit the same photo in black \& white and in color. They must take a new picture for each of their entries.
- Photos containing another person will be automatically disqualified.
- No CD's or Digital copies are required this year for photography


## Photography Classifications

1. Architecture - Man-made structures, buildings, iron works, bridges monuments, fountains, etc. Good lighting and proper lighting angle will be stressed, along with composition.
2. Still-Life - The photographing of inanimate objects placed into a pleasing arrangement by the photographer for the specific purpose of the resulting photograph. The most important phase of stilllife technique is lighting. Also, do not clutter the picture with too many objects.
3. Nature - A photograph of landscapes, animals, plants, insects, etc... in their natural settings. This could be pets, but pet pictures can be very boring if you do not use a lot of imagination to make them different. A pet picture which is different and interesting is a significant challenge.
II. PAPER FOLDING

A series of at least three different items that are related in some way and in proportion to each other. Difficultly should be age appropriate. Use appropriate paper. Judges look for strong creases, even folds, crisp lines, clean materials; use creativity and appropriate colors. Can be cut and glued if directions call for it. If a pattern or written directions are followed, bring the pattern and/or directions and display them with your project. Artwork should be displayed in a manner that enhances the relationship of the items.

## III. POPSICLE STICKS

Free from appearance of glue; uniform, good construction, use of creativity. If a pattern is followed, bring the pattern and display with your project. Popsicle sticks should be either small (normal) or large (craft style) and can either be notched or unnotched.

## IV. CLAY MODELING

Clay may be the type which hardens or the type which stays soft, such as modeling clay. Contestant must realize that the project is subject to mischief if it is soft.

## V. WOOD SCULPTURE

An entry fashioned from wood (must be carved). The contestant may use power tools. When necessary to use a larger bulk of solid wood, the contestant may glue several pieces of wood together before carving. This category does not include craft items such as miniatures or doll house items, model ships, or picture frames. However, the contestant may carve or chisel several objects which, when arranged for display, form an exhibit.

## VI. METAL SCULPTURE

Sculptures may be made from any type of metal. The work should be entirely that of the student. The contestant may use any type of grinders, nippers, or other power tools to form the pieces of metal that will be welded together.
VII. 3D MIXED MEDIUM - A combination of any of the following: Pen \& Ink, Pastels, Sketching, Acrylics, Watercolor, or Oil, clay, sculpting or craft items. Must contain at least two different mediums. This is not a collage of photos, or clippings. This competition is three (3) dimensional. Since there is already a popsicle stick category, please do not allow your project to contain more than $25 \%$ popsicle sticks

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

Each school may only bring the top two entries per category, per grade level (choirs may only have one entry per grade level)

Judges will be allowed to confer with each other.

Schools - please put your school's complete name on each copy of music.

## Music Selection

The choice of music is one of the most important factors in music competition. The best approach to the choice of music is not "Can I get away with this particular piece of music?", but rather, "Which music will be most effective in my Christian service?"

## 1. All music (vocal and instrumental), must be submitted to the FA Director for approval by January 9th

2. Music should be inoffensive to most fundamental believers. The following will not be allowed:
a. Country and Western
c. CCM (written or popularized by a new CCM artist)
b. Rock (of any kind)
d. Jazz
3. IF THE RHYTHM IS QUESTIONABLE, PLEASE DO NOT USE THE SONG. If the words were taken away and the music would give the impression of being a pop, slow rock, country or CCM style, the material is not acceptable. Without the words, which genre would the song fit into?
4. We encourage you to direct your students to choose songs at their highest skill level.
5. Music should have a proper balance between melody, harmony, and rhythm. Rhythm, especially, should not overwhelm the other two aspects. Excessive use of syncopated rhythms (at the discretion of the judges), is unacceptable.
6. Interpretive slurring of notes should be avoided. The competitor is being judged on how accurately he follows the music as it is written and presented to the judges. Any changes must be clearly marked on the score.
7. All music must be of the genre Sacred, except in the instrumental competitions. Sacred music is something that would be played in a church service. Competitors performing in the instrumental categories may choose from either Sacred or Classical. For classification purposes, approved folk music will fall under the classical category.

## GENERAL PERFORMANCE GUIDELINES

If these guidelines are not followed, they will no longer be qualified to place. They may only perform for the critique.

1. Contestants will be required to provide 3 pieces of music (one per judge) to the judges when they are called to perform. There is no requirement as to whether or not the pieces of music need to be copies or originals. Each school is to do their own due diligence to assure they are in compliance with copyright and duplication laws. Each school is solely liable for the copies that are submitted.

- All copies of music must have each measure numbered beginning with first full measure, before handed to the judge. This excludes pick up measures.

2. Instrumentalists must perform music exactly as it appears on the score. If it is written as a piano accompaniment piece, it cannot be an instrumental or piano solo. Any predetermined alterations must be clearly noted on the music submitted to the FA Director in January.
3. If a piece of music was composed to have an accompaniment, it must have an accompanist. If a piece was written to be unaccompanied, accompaniment may not be added.
4. Vocalists must perform music exactly as it appears on the music. If notes or words are changed, the music should be marked to reflect these changes. Accompanists are not judged. All $7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade competitions must sing at least half of the selection in parts. A "round" is not considered parts.
5. Appearance and poise points are also based on intro and exiting. Students must introduce who they are, what school they are from and what song they will be playing. This applies to every performance category. Those performances consisting of more than one contestant may choose one spokesman for the introduction.

## 6. Accompanists

A. Only live piano/organ accompaniment is permitted.
B. The competitor must be rehearsed and fully prepared with his or her accompanist before arriving at the competition. Do not seek an accompanist after arriving for competition. Do not expect the ABCS Fine Arts Department to provide accompanist. Any last-minute change because of illness or emergency is the responsibility of the competitor. The Fine Arts Director must be informed of the substitutions made.
C. Accompanists are not judged. Judging will be based on the contestant's performance, not the accompanist's skill.
D. The accompanist does not need to memorize the piece.
E. Accompanists may transpose music if they mark the transposition on the judges' copies.
F. A contestant may sing acapella (without accompaniment) only if the music was written as such. (I.E., if accompaniment is part of the selection, it must be played.)
G. It is wise for a single accompanist to only schedule themselves to accompany up to 12 performances. This is to keep any single accompanist from being overwhelmed as well as make scheduling realistic for the Fine Arts Director.
7. Music Memorization is required for:
A. Instrumental solos
B. All solos, choirs, and vocal groups
C. If sheet music is used by any of the above they will be qualify for placing in competition, but are welcome to preform in order to be critiqued.
D. If accompanist is also singing in the group, they may not have the words or vocal parts on their music. Only the piano accompaniment may be in front of accompanist.
8. Music Memorization is NOT required for:
A. Instrumental groups of two or more
B. Band/Orchestra/Chimes/Handbells
C. Piano Duets
9. No microphones will be allowed.
10. No substitutes are allowed after registration time, unless approved by the FA Director.
A. In case of an emergency or sickness, please contact the FA Director for directions in how to proceed.
11. No singing is to be done in instrumental pieces.
12. Ensemble and choirs - Schools may have two ensembles (5-8 participants) but only one choir (9+ participants) per competition grade division. Choirs or ensembles of combined grades will be judged at the highest grade level present in the group.
13. $4^{\text {th }}-7^{\text {th }}$ grade students are not required to sing harmony when part of a group. $7^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ is required to $\operatorname{sing}$ harmony at least $50 \%$ of the song. A multi-membered singing group is considered solely on the number of students singing, not the number of parts being sung. No more than two movements on each syllable in the melody.
14. A contestant is allowed only one entry per category. For example, a contestant will be allowed to participate in only ONE vocal quartet, ONE vocal trio, etc...
15. A KEYBOARD DUET may consist of one student on the piano and one on the organ, or two students on the piano.
16. Instrumental music will be categorized by grade level division. Contestants performing SACRED and CLASSICAL will compete in the same category.
17. For INSTRUMENTAL SOLOS, please specify on the registration form the division: BRASS, WOODWIND, STRING (BOW), STRING (PLUCKED), OR MISCELLANEOUS (includes such instruments as accordion, melodic percussion, recorder, bagpipe, harmonicas, etc.) Drums and amplified instruments are not permitted.
18. INSTRUMENTAL GROUPS consist of two or more approved instruments other than the piano or organ.
19. Vocal Solo competitions are gender separated.
20. Choir entries must not include solos. For other music groups, no more than one verse should be sung as a solo.
21. A student or school may not perform the same piece of music two years in a row.
22. Due to limited entries, Band and Orchestra will compete together. Bells and Chimes will compete together. Also, two pieces must be performed in each of these categories. Combining age groups is allowed.

## PIANO

1. Piano skill levels are divided into three sections. Here are the divisions:

Beginner: 24 months or less of lessons.
Intermediate: 25 to 48 months of lessons.
Advanced : 49 or more months of lessons.
2. Appearance and poise points are also based on intro and exiting. Students must introduce who they are, what school they are from and what song they will be playing.

1. Judges will pick TWO hymns from the list provided. The contestant may use music. These hymns should be played in an evangelistic manner, as if playing for a large evangelistic service with congregational singing. You will play an introduction, two verses and choruses of each hymn.
2. The contestant will be given two minutes (if needed) to look over the hymn, but not practice it. Then the contestant will play the hymn, using music.
3. All contestants will play from the same hymn book provided at the competition. "Soul Stirring Songs \& Hymns" will be used as the hymnal.

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

Each entry must be accompanied by the following:

1. A 3X5 card with the following information typed or printed:
(Use both sides if necessary)
a. The student's name, age, and grade
b. The school's name
c. The category of the entry (i.e., Beginning Sewing)
d. A list of material purchased to complete the project, cost (each) and a total cost.
2. The pattern(s) used. Please have only the pieces actually used in the envelope(s). If no pattern is used, please state this on your 3X5 card. See appendix for an example.
3. ALL WORK MUST BE THAT OF THE STUDENT.
4. Artist Idea Statement for all projects, found in the appendix of this book.
5. All work should meet standards as far as dress code.

Students must not receive help other than instructions. Contestants are allowed to enter one project in each category. PROJECTS MUST BE COMPLETELY FINISHED TO BE ELIGIBLE.

Fashions will be evaluated according to conservative Christian standards as well as skills. This would prohibit the entry of low-cut blouses, sleeveless, or see-through garments. Do not submit mini-skirts, slacks, pant suits, shorts, or bathing suits.

The contestant is encouraged to be creative and vary from the pattern. Be certain to explain the differences. If the garment is a compilation of several patterns, the pieces used from each pattern should accompany the entry. Please submit only the pieces used.

NOTE: Even though a garment entry is slightly wrinkled in route to the competition, the correct pressing of each part as it was assembled will be evident to the judges. Neatness will be of utmost importance.

Seam finishes are judged according to the work involved as well as neatness. Serge entries will not be judged separately.

## GUIDELINES FOR CATEGORIES

1. SEWING
A. Beginning Sewing

Aprons, placemats, napkins, luncheon tablecloth with napkins, baby bibs, potholders, pillows, book bags, simple skirts. The judges will have the final say as to whether an item should be placed in this category. SPONSORS: PLEASE DO NOT ALLOW EXPERIENCED SEWERS TO ENTER THIS CATEGORY.
B. Intermediate Sewing

Dresses, jackets, skirt with pleats, blouse, any item that displays advanced skill such as having buttonholes, zippers, pleats, reversible, etc... No kits. Please provide patterns with your projects.
2. NEEDLEWORK
A. Embroidery

Decorating fabric with embroidery floss or thread: scarves, pillowcases, tablecloths, shirts, hand towels, placemats, collars, handkerchiefs, borders for skirts, pillows, pictures, or samplers. Only regular "Needle and Thread" embroidery will be judged. THE BACKS OF ALL ENTRIES MUST
BE ACCESSIBLE FOR JUDGING. Leave the cover off the back or use clear plastic for a backing.
B. Needlepoint

Decorating open-weave canvas with wool (or synthetic) yarns: Handbags, pictures, plaques, chair covers and pillows. Pictures must be framed. THE BACK OF ALL WORK MUST BE
ACCESSIBLE FOR JUDGING. Leave sides of pillows unsown. Rugs are not included in this category.
C. Counted Cross-Stitch

Decorating Aida, Hardanger, canvas, or gingham fabric with embroidery floss in crossed stitches:
Pictures, plaques, paperweights, serving trays under glass, keychains, borders for skirts, tablecloths, pillowcases, blouses, shirts, etc. Pictures must be framed. THE BACK OF ALL WORK MUST
BE ACCESSIBLE FOR JUDGING. This may mean leaving side seams on pillows unsown, etc. Kits without printing on the fabric may be entered.

## 3. OTHER HANDIWORK

A. Crochet

Doilies, placemats, handbags, lace dresses or other articles of clothing, blanket edging, afghans, and baby clothing.
B. Knitting

Sweaters, gloves, scarves, dresses, afghans, and baby clothes.
C. Latch hook

Latch hook kits or other items created using latch hook methods and materials. Stamped on patterns are permissible.

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

Students appearing in any platform competition should observe these important points, as they will enter into judging.

## I. ALL SPEECH SELECTIONS MUST BE SUBMITTED TO THE FA DIRECTOR BY January $9^{\text {th }}$.

## II. ALL SELECTIONS MUST BE COMPLETELY MEMORIZED.

a) Contestants must provide the judges with THREE COPIES of a TYPE-WRITTEN copies of selection with the student's name, age, grade, school name, and entry category on the front cover.
b) Each school is to do their own due diligence to assure they are in compliance with copyright and duplication laws. Each school is solely liable for the copies that are submitted.
c) Material should be in good taste and high quality. If "Author Unknown" piece is used, site source. (i.e., website poem was found on.)
III. Prompts will be allowed - 5 for elementary competitors

3 for junior high competitors
1 for senior high competitors

## CATEGORY GUIDELINES

## I. POETRY RECITATION

If the poem you select is too short, you may learn a collection of poems (two or more). They should be similar enough in theme that they blend well together. You may want to say something between poems as a transitional statement. This will most likely be original, but it must be included in the type-written script between poems.
II. MONOLOGUE - includes Religious Recitation, Dramatic Monologue, and Expressive Monologue

1. The script may be self-written.
2. Create an atmosphere by using tone of voice, inflections, pauses, and gestures.
3. No costumes, sets, or singing is allowed. One prop is allowed.
4. The monologue must be memorized.
a. RELIGIOUS/SCRIPTURE RECITATION

This would include any selections of a religious nature - message or passages of scripture. Again, it MUST be memorized!
b. DRAMATIC MONOLOGUE

A contestant characterizes an individual, expressing that individual's thoughts, emotions, and reactions in a particular set of circumstances or events relevant to that individual. The presentation must be in the first person. The intent is to convey dramatic skills in which the contestant demonstrates ability in a dramatic presentation.

## c. EXPRESSIVE MONOLOGUE

Contestants memorize and perform a humorous selection. The intent is for the contestant to demonstrate ability in a conveying a story or expressive speech presentation.

## III. DUET ACTING

Two contestants present an original dialogue or an adaptation of a written dialogue between two individuals. Script may be fact or fiction. The primary emphasis of this event is on the verbal interchange between two characters. The dialogue must leave a clear, positive message in the minds of the audience. This event should employ all the skills of a good dramatic presentation.

1. Girls portray females; boys portray males.
2. Only two characters may be portrayed.
3. Costumes and one prop are permissible, but they are used only to enhance what has already been written in the script.
4. No recorded speaking, singing, or sound effects are permitted.
IV. READERS THEATER *(does NOT need to be memorized - can be read from script)

The oral, read presentation of dramatic, poetic, or prose material by a group, utilizing some or all of the following techniques: dramatic _ $V_{-}$, out of scene, characterization, group speaking, and group movement. Movement is limited to switching of positions, one or two steps backward or forward, turning around, and standing or sitting. The presentation may include these types: cameo (face only movement), upper body, or whole-body movement.

1. Group size consists of three (3) to ten (10) contestants.
2. Contestants may make use of one prop or costume accessory (such as an umbrella, shawl, gloves, hat, glasses, etc...). No makeup, lighting, full costumes, or furniture.
3. All members dressed in black (or any color) or in the same style shall not be considered to be wearing costumes.
4. The presentation will be judged on originality of arrangement and the skillful use of the techniques to move the audience with the chosen material.
5. No more that $25 \%$ of your performance may be used for singing and sound effects. All singing and sound effects must be relevant to the literary piece.
6. Any form of literature, poetry or prose, adapted to the Readers' Theater form will be appropriate for this contest. All literature must meet acceptable guidelines. Self-written is acceptable; plagiarized works will be disqualified.

## V. BIBLE TEACHING

Only $4^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade young ladies may participate. The contestant tells a Bible-based story (i.e., missionary adventure) suitable for a Sunday School lesson for children. It must have an appropriate Christian application. The storyteller may use such items as flannel graph, visual aids, costume, sound effects, accompaniment, or any _prop_ that enhances story material.

1. Each contestant must indicate to judges to which age group she is teaching.
2. Contestant must use one hand-held illustration (picture, tools, books, etc...). Puppets may be used.
3. This event is NOT a one-act play, an expressive reading with props, nor may it be a poem. The emphasis is to be on telling an effective story.
4. Setup time is limited to two (2) minutes.
5. The Passage of Scripture for Bible Teaching this year, 2024, Daniel Chapter 3. The topic of this lesson will be how the threat of persecution did not stop them from serving God.
6. Young ladies should not just tell the story, but also include an application (Something spiritual that the audience can apply to their lives). On the judging sheet, this is described as worthwhile message.
VI. PREACHING - Memorization isn't required, and outlines must be submitted to FA director along with essays and speech submissions.
$4^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade young men may participate. Please refer to platform general guidelines before preparing for preaching competition. Seventh through ninth grades will have 5-8 minutes to deliver their sermon. Tenth through twelfth grades have 8-12 minutes for their delivery.

A contestant must prepare and deliver an original sermon. Each sermon will be judged on Biblical content, outline, and effective delivery, as well as on the general guidelines given under "Platform Division." Grammar is very important!

Messages should have a target audience. If message is not intended as a salvation message, the speaker must include an invitation in his conclusion.

Preaching must honor God.

## HINTS FROM THE PREACHING JUDGES.

Your first task in preparing to preach is to develop a good outline. This will be the heart of your sermon; and, since you must adhere to your outline carefully, you will want to make it do its best work for you. Your outline should flow naturally from the Scripture text and should be detailed and clearly organized with an introduction and conclusion. Be sure to include fitting illustrations and supporting Scriptures that lead logically to your conclusion. While notes are permissible, it should not be obvious that you are using them. Have someone evaluate your delivery to be sure it includes variety in gesture, voice inflection, and volume. Variety is important as it attracts your listeners' attention more than sheer volume or speed can; loud and fast are not always best! Above all, be sure your message is Scriptural, is theologically correct, and leads the listener to an appropriate decision about his Christian life.
